Church Revitalization: **Practical Ideas for Getting Started**

Create (Early) Wins

Paul Borden interviewed pastors who had lead revitalization in their churches, and asked them what they did when they first came to the church. From these interviews, he suggests thirteen areas where a pastor can have some early wins. Although many of us are not in our first year at a church, we can still learn from Borden's list.

Let's spend some time discussing these areas together:

1. Learn the congregation	Stats, personal contacts, previous pastors
2. Learn the community	Stats, personal contacts, walk/drive around
3. Develop a first-year plan	Include some of items 1-13 in your plan
4. Gather people	Who? How?
5. Create big events	Pre-evangelism and evangelism events
6. Improve curb appeal	What? How? \$?
7. Energize worship	Preaching, worship, service order, other
8. Communicate (Vision)	Preaching, one-on-one, groups
9. Recruit leaders	Who? How?
10. Be present in the community	Connect in positive ways
11. Evangelize	Who? How?
12. Address Money	Money issues – systems, reports, spending
13. Pray ¹	Prayer for the church's vision

Borden notes that a pastor should **"select three, four, or five things to do, driven by the ministry context in which you find yourself."**² The pastor will need to choose the areas that are most <u>needed</u>, and most <u>attainable</u>.

However, Borden reports that, "In all the interviews pastors identified one common denominator during their first year: building congregational attendance." Focussing on a few of the fifteen areas listed above can help you achieve this goal of building congregational attendance.

Additional Note: Charles Stone's book *Every Pastor's First 180 Days* is filled with practical leadership principles that will help a pastor get started in revitalization. I highly recommend it!
